In 1888 Charles Quin, mining manager, was operating from an office at 22A market Buildings, Market St. Melbourne. When his wife Sarah died in 1893, Charles and Sarah were living at 7 Elm Grove, Windsor.

In the years following Sarah's death, Charles was involved in a series of mining ventures at places as diverse as Colac, Victoria: Nelligan NSW; Tasmania and NE Victoria.

After 1897 there are no further records found and despite further research, no conclusive evidence could be located of his death in either Australia or New Zealand.

DEATH OF MR. JAS. G. QUIN. At his residence, Hope-street, Mr. Jas. G. Quin passed away, surrounded by all the members of his family save one who is in Western Australia, at 12.45 this morning. The cause of death was diabetes, for which he had been treated by Dr. Atkinson.

Mr. Quin was 68 years of age, and a native of Annan, Dumfriesshires, Scotland, and ranked amongst the pioneers of Bendigo. Arriving on this field in 1855, he directed his attention to digging, but met with indifferent fortune. He was a stonecutter by trade, which occupation



he followed for some years, being a partner with Mr. P. Finn. Upon the dissolution of partnership Mr. Quin assumed the custodianship of the Masonic Hall, and also acted as secretary to the Rechabites, Star of Bendigo Tent.

He left a family of eight, viz., Messrs. W. and R. Quin, both in the employ of Messrs. P. Finn and Co.; Mrs. Ladson, wife of Mr. G. Ladson, farmer, Thoona; Mr. Jas. Quin an engine driver at the Great Boulder mine, W.A.; Miss Alice Quin, nurse, late matron of the Swan Hill Hospital; Mr. Chas. Quin, compositor, Inglewood "Advertiser;" Misses Effie and Millicent Quin, teachers at the Central State School, and Miss Annie Quin, teacher at the Avoca State School.

The funeral will take place on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock. The deceased gentleman was a prominent member of the order of Freemasons, and for many years acted as tyler to the Golden and Corinthian and Zenith lodges. He was a man of sterling principles, upright and honorable to a degree, and his death will be sincerely regretted by a wide circle of friends.

His health has been failing for some time, but the ailment only developed seriously about three weeks ago.

About 20 years ago Mr, James Quin took the position of caretaker to the Masonic Hall, and was also secretary to the Rechabites Star of Bendigo Tent. For a long time he was an active member of the old Temperance Fire Brigade, and up to his death was an honorary member of the Bendigo Brigade.
